Introducing a community artist: Barbara Huntington

Training as a Diversional Therapist with the Australian Red Cross Society in Sydney in their rehabilitation centre gave me a good grounding in several creative techniques. Later I built on these skills with a Craft Textiles Certificate at TAFE Strathfield followed by a Batchelor of Arts degree majoring in Textiles Studies at Newcastle University.

Barbara explains what methods she undertakes to create:

Creativity has been central to my life from an early age, it provides solace in hard times and a source of joy for celebrations.

The arts have enhanced my appreciation of our environment through the sourcing of natural dyeing materials to colour silk and wool. Observing when to collect and what is available when needed for dyeing. Involvement in textiles has strengthened my connection to others through shared interest in textiles of many kinds. I exhibit with the Fibre Artists Network which formed in the early 1990's. We meet monthly and exhibit yearly.

The techniques I use are slow stitching, natural dyeing, weaving and felt making. Through using these techniques, I express ideas, explore techniques and emotions. The rhythmic action of slow stitching helps me maintain equanimity when news is so negative.

Natural dyeing using windfall Eucalyptus leaves not only gives great prints on silk, linen or cotton it also fills the house with a great aroma. Natural dyeing, I feel contains an element of magic, I never start until it feels just right. It can be both very exciting and disappointing.

Currently, as I no longer have a dedicated studio, I am working in segments that can be joined together to make a larger piece.

At times I exhibit with friends or the Fibre Artists Network (FAN). Currently we are working on the theme "Looking Back moving forward......bringing the past with us". For this project we are reimagining a traditional technique of our choice. I have decided to use the old quilting technique of Suffolk Puffs. I am recycling found doilies and left- over pieces of dyed silk and cotton, pieces of lace and some embroided linens for the puffs.

Most of my materials come from Second- hand shops which are a great resource for the textile artist, providing threads, fabrics and surprises to delight. Using these found threads is a further connection to others, whom I may never meet, but who I know share my interest and love of textiles.

Gardening Tips

Mild weather is making the gardens look lovely. Instructions for a simple compost bin/worm farm Dig a hole big enough for a 20lt bucket with a lid. Drill 8 x 12mm holes 50 mm from the base of the bucket.

Place bucket in hole and back fill with lid 100mm above the soil level. Place food scraps in bucket and replace lid to stop flies. You can seed with worms but they will turn up naturally. Its a good time to plant winter veg.

Winter Beef casserole

Brisket (beef) is well prices at the moment and makes a excellent casserole or soup. If you have a slow cooker, dice and add onions, and any left over vegetable (old vegetable that have seen better days are great) to the slow cooker. Brown the brisket in a frypan and add to the slow cooker. Add a can of tomatoes if you have one in the cupboard. Or add 2 cups of water. Let cook slowly for 8 hours. At about the 6 hour mark peel and cut potato, pumpkin and carrot, and continue to cook for 2 more hours add salt and pepper to taste.

Remove all the ingredients from the slow cooker and thicken the liquid. Break the brisket in to large chunks and serve with bread. It can also be served with rice or noodles

Chicken Pear and Leek soup. (Generously supplied by Heather Kind)

2 medium chicken breasts

1 liter of water

Ingredients

500 ml of chicken stock 3 medium leeks - cleaned and thinly sliced

3 pears 1 large onion - chopped

Tablespoon of Oil

Salt, pepper, cayenne pepper, other seasonings as desired

150ml cream Fresh mint

Method

Serves4+

Put chicken breasts in water, bring to boil reduce to a simmer. Simmer for 10 minutes.

Lift chicken out and allow it to cool. Cover and set aside.

Retain cooking liquid. Fry off onions in oil, add some of the chicken cooking liquid,

add leeks. Saute/cook for 5 to 10. Peel, core, and chop two of the pears and add to leek and

onion mixture. Add remaining chicken cooking liquid, chicken stock, salt and peppers, seasonings.

Bring to boil reduce to a simmer. Cook for 30 min. Cool a little, puree, return to pan. Cook over low heat till heated through. Slice cooked chicken, peel, core and slice remaining pear and add to pot. Stir and heat through for about 5 minutes. Adjust seasonings to taste. Ladle into bowl, add dollop of cream and fresh mint.

What makes up a pressure sewer system? The pressure sewer system is made up of four key elements,

- 1. Property Discharge Line The property discharge line is a small diameter pipe that connects the property's grinder pump to the pressure sewer in the street.
- 2. Boundary Kit The boundary kit ensures that wastewater which is already in the pressure sewer cannot re-enter your property and enables maintenance staff to isolate the grinder pump from the reticulation system in the event of an outage.
- 3. Collection Tank and Grinder Pump Installed underground, with only the top of the collection tank (or lid) visible, this component of the system includes a grinder pump and collection tank.
- 4. Alarm Panel A small panel mounted to the wall of the house that provides power to the grinder pump. Includes both the audible and visual alarm systems for the purpose of providing adequate warning when the system needs to be serviced by Kempsey Shire Council.
- 5. Inspection Shaft The inspection shaft is a plumbing fixture that allows plumbers to inspect and service your property service drain. It is a key fixture for future inspections and maintenance works that may be required on the property. It is important that property owners maintain access to this fixture. The inspection shaft is the responsibility of the property owner.
- 6. Overflow Relief Gully An overflow relief gully protects the interior of your home or building from sewerage overflow. It is adrain- like fitting located outside the property that is an important part of the plumbing system. In the event of a sewer blockage, the overflow relief gully is designed to release any sewerage flow away from the interior of the building and outside, to a garden or external area. It is important for property owners to keep the overflow relief gully clear and unimpeded at all times. The overflow relief gully is the responsibility of the property owner.
- 7. Property Service Drain The property service drain is the section of gravity pipeline connecting the sewage pipe outlets from the house to the inspection shaft adjacent to the collection tank. The property service drain is the responsibility of the property owner.
- 8. The MSB is the main electrical switchboard that connects the property to the power supply system. It will have a connection point and circuit breaker designated for the power supply to the alarm panel and grinder pump. The supply of power and associated costs is the responsibility of the property owner.

Why has Council decided to proceed with the scheme now?

The progress of the project is in line with Council resolutions from 2018 and 2020 outlined above. The key driver for the Stuarts Point Sewerage Scheme is addressing the issues with existing onsite sewage management systems. Typically homes within the scheme area are 40 years old, or older, and their sewage systems do not comply with modern standards for treatment and disposal. These systems risk groundwater contamination and associated public health impacts via overf bw events and ineffective treatment. All the properties in Stuarts Point, Grassy Head and Fishermans Reach presently rely on onsite sewage management systems to treat and dispose of eff luent. Many residences are served by septic tanks equipped with absorption trenches or pump-out systems.

Council is focused on providing the most sustainable sewerage service to beneft and meet the needs of the community.

The proposed modern centralised sewerage scheme will have numerous benefts for the entire area, including a positive environmental impact by reducing onsite system leakage and eliminating

odour and water quality issues.
