You may have noticed the new SPaDCO community sign near the tennis courts. This is a manual sign! It will contain important dates and notifications and during fire and flood events will contain vital and important information for the community.

IPART have made a decision regarding the Kempsey Council special variation rate rise. The information is set out overleaf.

Lots of good things have been happening in the Point. During the last while, the tennis courts renovation was completed. Many people have booked and played on the newly refurbished courts and that is great to see. Bookings are made at the IGA supermarket and keys can be collected there.

The cenotaph was renovated in time for the Anzac Day service on the 25th April. The march and the service was very well attended - great to see so many people pay their respect to our past and present ANZAC men and women. Bunnings Kempsey (Luke) have been very generous in supporting our community by donating plants for the cenotaph.

The grounds opposite, beside the hall, have been levelled and will be seeded so the area can again be grassed. Please be careful when parking.

Kempsey Shire Council came to Stuarts Point to present the operational plan for the LGA for 24-25 financial year. The sad reality is that KSC has not got much in the pipeline for Stuarts Point and district for next financial year. The sewerage work will continue in preparation for installation The EIS is being done and will be on display for comment later in the year.

The Five Headlands Coastal Experience is a joint venture between National Parks Council of NSW and the KSC. There is still much work to be done and the first stage of the walk will be complete in June 2026.

The Grassy Head caravan park playground is on hold with the council undertaking community consultation and working toward a environmentally suitable facility.

All the area caravan parks (leased to the NRMA) are receiving the councils attention. The caravan parks are being updated with finance generated by the park users. These works are not funded by the community, but are monies collected through fees associated within the parks. With a renewed focus on tourism in this LGA, caravan parks are seen as generating an important financial contribution.

The Fishermans Reach boat ramp bus turning circle is a shoulder project within the councils '24-25 year plans.

Ocean Blend cafe is now open (Formally Matts cafe). Drop in and say hi, while tasting a delicious treat. Lets support our local businesses. Wednesday - Sunday.

IPart decision regarding the Special rate variation for the Kempsey since council

Executive summary Kempsey Shire Council Special Variation Application 2024-2025 The council did broadly demonstrate a financial need for an SV to maintain its financial sustainability while continuing to provide services and maintain infrastructure required by its community (criterion 1). However, it did not demonstrate that it needs the full 42.70% increase it proposed over 3 years. This is because it has scope to continue to explore alternatives to this proposed increase over the next 2 years. This could reduce the size of the rate increase required beyond this period. • The council did not demonstrate the community is aware of the need for and extent of the proposed rate increases (criterion 2). It did engage with and consult its community on the proposed SV. However, its consultation materials did not include key information that ratepayers required to properly understand why the rate rise is necessary, and the specific expenditure priorities driving the size of the increase. For example, it did not clearly explain that without the SV, it will have to increase its borrowings to fund its infrastructure priorities, and that the cost of servicing this additional debt will approach 20% of its operating revenue by 2032-33. • The council did not show the impact of the proposed SV on ratepayers is reasonable (criterion 3). It did evaluate the relative wealth and financial capacity to pay across the Kempsey area. It concluded its community has both capacity and willingness to pay the proposed rate increases, provided that support is available for those with higher levels of disadvantage. However, this conclusion is not well supported by the council's analysis. Our assessment found that currently its average residential rates are slightly higher than the average for neighbouring and comparable councils. However, by the end of the proposed 3-year SV period, they would be significantly higher than the averages for those councils. We note its area has more disadvantage than 122 council areas in the state (out of the total of 128). Our decision to approve a 2-year SV of 24.09% instead of the proposed 3-year SV of 42.70% reflects the council's clear need for additional income while also taking account of the shortcomings in its application and community feedback on the proposed SV.
